

Team advances to nationals

Columbus High School seniors Craig Duncan and Zackery Lindsley proved they were the best automotive technology team in Nebraska by winning the state finals of the 2009 Ford/AAA Student Auto Skills Challenge.

They earned the state championship after properly diagnosing and repairing all planted defects on their 2009 Ford Focus in record time beating out nine other Nebraska high school teams. In doing so, both students earned multiple scholarships, plus an expense paid trip to Detroit, Michigan, to represent Nebraska at the national competition.

CHS automotives instructor Ron Haefner said the contest was challenging.

"They were the only ones to find all the bugs," he said. "They were the only team to get their back up lights working."

This marks the second year in a row that a CHS team qualified for the national competition. CHS still holds the title of the longest streak of first place finishes at state spanning six years from 1999-2004 before hitting a slump from 2005-2007.

"I think we are back on track now," Haefner said about winning state titles.

For Duncan, participation in the Ford/AAA Student Auto Skills Challenge had become a family tradition. Three older brothers represented CHS at previous state championship events. Two earned first place and advanced to the national finals.

"Craig is the last one from the family," Haefner said. "He put a lot of pressure on himself, but the team did well."

Duncan said the most difficult part of the competition was trying not to feel the pressure of the competition.

Lindsley agreed.

"It was kind of stressful doing the competition," he said. "It was hard to control your nerves."

Both said Haefner did a good job preparing them for the competition. Haefner said the national contest will be a lot more intense.

"The level is a lot higher, and we are only a comprehensive high school and not a technical high school," he said.

Many other states have technical high schools where the focus is on automotives, and they can practice eight hours a day.

Haefner said the team would not have done as well if Gene Steffy Ford did not provide a practice vehicle. The vehicle the dealership provided allowed the students to become familiar with the car's intricate system.

This familiarization helped a great deal as it took only 64 minutes for the students to identify and properly repair the intentionally installed "bugs" on their vehicle. The quality of workmanship is extremely important in this contest as errors can result in costly demerits.

Columbus was also recognized for earning the top written score on an automotive technology exam, which was administered earlier in the year.

Duncan plans to attend Southeast Community College-Milford and Lindsley Doane College.

Sara Jones and William Stanton both received a \$1,000 Wilson-Covert Centennial Scholarship. This award was named for Arthur Philip Wilson and Velma Covert Wilson. The Discoverers boys soccer team led the spring sports making its first ever trip to the state Class B finals only to come up short in a 1-0 overtime loss to cross town rival Scotus Central Catholic. Coached by Jamie Bennett, they finished the season with a 14-5 record, qualifying as a wild card entry after losing in a shoot-out in the district finals. Seniors Mike Ziola (Class B All-State), Parker Staroscik and Andy Christensen led the team.

The girls soccer team was led by first year coach Kevin Ainsworth. They finished the season with a 9-6 record losing in districts to Scotus 2-1. The girls' team was paced by seniors Shelby Hughes, Maggie Arlt and Danielle Archuleta. Mike Ziola and Danielle Archuleta were named to play in the Shrine All-Star game this summer.

After traveling from one end of the state to the other, the CHS track squads finished the season strong qualifying several athletes for the state competition. The girls led by long time coach Bob Hopp had a successful run with senior Jena Schwalenberg taking third in the 3200 and 1600 meter runs. The 3200 relay team, which includes Schwalenberg, junior Bridgette Schneekloth and freshmen Kyla Szelag and Karo Garcia, also took third.

Other qualifiers included: sophomore Brianna Downs (T-8th) senior Lindsay Anderson in the pole vault, senior Alecyia Watson in the 100 hurdles and triple jump, senior Elizabeth Wheatley in high jump, Schneekloth in the1600 and 3200 Meter runs, Garcia in the 800M run and senior Rachael Weber, sophomore Megan Weber, Szelag and Garcia in the 1600 Meter Relay. Coached by Dan Steiner the boys' team was led by Zackery Lindsley qualifying for state in the discus (2nd Place) and shot put (9th place) and Dean Shurter who placed seventh in the discus. Lindsley set a school record this season with a throw of 181'-4" at the district meet. Junior Jon Powell was a qualifier in the 3200M run finishing 13th at the state meet. Middle distance runners seniors Alex Markham, Trevor Urkoski and Andrew Messersmith provided depth and leadership throughout the season earning medals at the conference and district meets.

The girls tennis team finished the spring season strong taking 11th at the state meet. Coach Dave Licari's squad all won their opening matches at state before losing tough second round matches. The CHS team consisted of #1 singles Lori Fehr, #2 singles Jennifer Gokie, #1 doubles Ashley Meyers and Sammi Licari and #2 doubles Lori Haas and Jenna Stecker.

The boys baseball team, led by veteran coach Mark Mueller, was paced by seniors Kurt Farmer, Michael Blatchford, Jon Raitt, Chase Stanton, Justin Eckholt and Jordan Eckholt. The Discoverers finished the season with a 22-10 record losing to eventual state champion Omaha Westside 9-3 in the district finals. Farmer was named first team All-Nebraska by the Omaha World Herald and Blatchford was a second team selection. Coach Mueller will have to rely on young talent next year as this year's squad was very heavy with seniors.

A young CHS golf team coached by Mark Brown, who is in his first year, made great strides finishing fifth at the district meet. Junior Jordan Williams was the lone Discoverer to qualify for state shooting a 75 good for a third place finish. Williams shot 77 and 78 respectively at the state competition to finish out of medal contention. Coach Brown will have his entire squad back next year, Matt Otten, Dennis Bouc, Brett Beal and Jason Krings will join Williams on next year's team.

Class of 1958 makes donation to CMS

Columbus Middle School students can explore the career of electronics thanks to donation from the Class of 1958.

"We are very grateful for the support from the Class of 1958," CMS Principal Doug Kluth said. "Their donation will touch the lives of thousands of students."

The gift allowed another module to be added to the career application class. Students will get a sample of electronics and can assess if this is something they would like to pursue in high school and possibly even as a career.

In the electronic module, students learn the common components of basic circuits in electronic devises. They also complete various electronic experiments using an educational instrument. The construction of a simple electronics kit helps them learn the application of each component used to make the project successfully function.

The skills taught in this module can give the students an edge in the future, teacher Kelly Loschen said.

"Our lives are filled with electronic devices that affect the way we live," he said. "Components used in electrical devices are very small and getting smaller, which makes them easier and less costly to produce. As people use more electronic gadgets, understanding electrical components will be a valuable skill."

This year CMS changed the career application classes to align with the Nebraska Career Model. The model breaks down careers into six areas: health science; human services

and resources; business, marketing and management; environmental and agricultural systems; communication and information systems; and industrial manufacturing and engineering systems. Eventually, there will be three to four modules for each of the six clusters.

The Class of 1958 was the last class to graduate from Kramer High, which is now the middle school, and the classmates wanted to give something back to the school from which they graduated.
