Hundreds of Columbus Public Schools graduates have found rewarding careers in health care, and some have gone on to become doctors. Here's an update on some of those graduates — and what they're doing now.

Amy (Busteed) Blaser — CHS Class of 1988

RON ERNST, MD Class of 1974

Back in high school, Ernst loved participating in sports such as football, basket-

ball and golf—but he also knew he was interested in the sciences. So, when a medical organization came to Columbus High School to talk to



students about opportunities in health care and a general surgeon spoke, Ernst was mesmerized.

"I thought, this was what I was going to do," he said.

It was no wonder Ernst wanted to be a surgeon — his two favorite classes at CHS were chemistry with Mr. Dickson and calculus with Mr. Nitsche.

After high school, he followed the pre-med program at University of Nebras-ka-Lincoln, and attended medical school at University of Nebraska Medical Center in Omaha.

He kept in contact with that surgeon he met in high school, and there was never any doubt in his mind that he wanted to go into general surgery.

Ernst came back to Columbus and practiced general surgery here for 34 years before retiring in 2021.

Now, he loves spending time with his wife Anne and three of his grandchildren who live in town. "I love Columbus," he said. "I believe it's a great place to spend your life."

DAN KOLDER, MD

Class of 1996

Kolder likes to joke that he "took all the

nerd classes" when he was at CHS geometry, calculus, and double periods in biology, chemistry and physics.



His diligence paid
off — he is now a
plastic surgeon with his own practice in
Santa Barbara, California.

When he was a student at CHS, he says his most influential teacher was Cathy Kwapnioski, who taught Spanish and English.

"She was the first teacher who talked to me like I was an adult," he said. "We would joke back and forth. She was just an awesome presence at the school."

After high school, he attended Creighton University in Omaha,

Nebraska, where he felt very comfortable in classes with students who had received their educations at private schools. "Columbus High School really was a great place to go to school and learn," he said.

He says he ended up in California because he "drove west until there wasn't humidity or bugs."

He has two children — a sophomore in high school and an eighth-grader. "We've raised them in southern California on Midwest values," he said.

CHAD TRAVERS, MD

Class of 1998

Although Chad Travers now works as a cardiologist at Bryan Heart in Lincoln,



Nebraska, he still gets the chance to interact with people from his hometown: He comes here for clinic once a week.


"I have friends and former teachers

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

In the past month, the Columbus Public Schools Board of Education has approved CPS to go into contract with JNW Consultants out of Scottsbluff and Lincoln to help guide our school

district in developing our next five year strategic plan. The district is long overdue in developing a new plan.

The past three years have been historical due to the pandemic.

There is urgency in getting our practices and procedures back to normal. You may ask yourself the question, does the district really rely on the strategic plan in decisions they make? The answer is, yes.
