CHS grad oversees roads

Everyday hundreds of vehicles of all sizes and shapes use the highways and roads around the Columbus area. Every so often work has to be done on the roads and highways that crisscross the community.

The job of overseeing the welfare of our road system in Platte County as well as Butler, Colfax and Boone counties belongs to Dave Anderson, 1970 graduate of CHS. Dave is the overall project manager with the Nebraska Department of Roads. It is Dave's job to make sure your state and federal tax dollars are spent wisely and correctly.

When a project such as the recent viaduct was going on, Dave had to make sure it was done right. He had to get all the players involved with the project together and figure out how this project was going to get done, how much it would cost and when it would start and end.

Dave and his staff must get contractors, sub-contractors, city personnel, law enforcement agencies, city officials, state officials and business people on the same page. This type of undertaking takes time and the cooperation of many individuals and agencies for it to work and for the project to be completed. Lucky for us, Dave has been in this business a long time and has had a lot of experience in overseeing large projects like the viaduct.

Dave began is career with the Department of Roads in 1971 after a short career with JcPenny and Johansan Construction. He started in the engineering department and wanted to make sure the road work being done was according to state and federal standards.

Dave said he wished he would have paid more attention to his math teachers at CHS because his job required a strong math background. He also said later when he was working with a crew with a lot of Spanish speaking workers, his Spanish skills were pretty rusty.

Dave said when he first stared he had to get familiar with a slide ruler and now everything is done with computers. Dave, like a lot of older CHS graduates, did not have computer classes and what computers were around then took up a whole classroom. Now thanks to computers that are small enough to fit in the palm of his hand his job is a little easier.

Dave reported that his biggest headaches now are funding. Before higher gas prices, the State of Nebraska depended on gasoline tax money to fund much if not all of the highway improvements and expansion. Now it is federal dollars that help with keeping our roadways in good working order.

The northern bypass in Columbus is a good example of using federal dollars, according to Dave. He explained that the project was halted at one time due to a lack of money to finish the job. When the Feds were handing out stimulus money the project qualified because it was already "shovel ready."

Dave does not know what will happen in the future when the stimulus money runs out.

Many of you who attended Kramer High School in Columbus may not know anything about the gentleman the school was named after. Here is just a snippet of one of the most active and notable citizens of Columbus, Nebraska.

Carl Kramer was born in Germany in 1845. At the age of 12, he migrated to the United States and settled in Chicago. He traveled across country holding numerous jobs until, at age 20, he and his brother started the "Famous Clothing Store" in Chicago. He moved West with his brothers and owned stores in Columbus, Schuyler, Kearney & North Platte. He was married and had 4 children.

That's the background, now for the good stuff. Probably no other man in the history of Columbus ever held as many different positions of public trust as Carl Kramer. He served on the City Council, County Board of Supervisors and 40 years as a member of the Board of Education, of which much of the time he was president.

He was Postmaster 18 years and Chairman of the Republican County Committee and a member of the Republican State Central Committee. Carl was secretary of the Columbus Cemetery Association, served as President of the YMCA Business Men's Club, President of the Commercial Club and Director of the Columbus Baseball Association. Wait, there's more.

Carl was President of the Nebraska State Association of School Boards, member of the Elks, the Modern Woodmen of America, and the Chamber of Commerce.

Wow, this guy was busy! The Loup River Bridge was built while he was a county supervisor. The waterworks system was built when he was mayor, and all of the school buildings were built when he was on the board of education.

He was often referred to as the Father of the Schools. For these efforts, the City acknowledged his work by naming Kramer High School in his honor.

As Paul Harvey often said, "Now you know the rest of the story!"
